Hanover's own Mu Xi chapter is active on campus in planning retreats, campus events, and bringing in speakers for both members and the rest of the campus community to enjoy.

GOVERNANCE:

Interfraternal Council (IFC)

IFC is the governing body for fraternities on Hanover's campus. It is composed of a seven member executive board, and advisor and two representatives from each Greek house. We are in charge of recruitment and all Greek activities, (for enjoyment and judicial purposes), planned to form a closer union between Greek fraternal organizations, to form a closer union with Hanover College administration, and to promote those goals common to the Greek fraternities.

Panhellenic Council (Panhel)

The Panhellenic Council is the governing body of the women's Greek Chapters at Hanover College. It is made up of 8 executive council members and 2 delegates from each chapter. Panhel is in charge of implementing programming that is educational both for the Greek and non-Greek community. It plans community service and philanthropic events at

least once a year. The council hosts such events as the Hanover Park clean up, chili cook-off, Greek Week, speakers, and recruitment events. It is a resource for information and guidance in helping the Greek Chapters to work together as a community under the same purposes. The Panhellenic council also coordinates the recruitment process and activities for the four Chapters. Its primary purpose is to help unite the women's Chapters, to work with the men's Chapters, and improve relations within the Greek Community and with the campus of Hanover College.

Student Senate

Student Senate, unlike any other organization on campus, has a great responsibility to listen, represent, and address the needs of its constituents while acting as the central liaison between the student body and Hanover's faculty, administration, and staff. With dedicated members representing all facets of our student culture, Senate "partners with faculty members, administrators, Student Life staff, and Campus Security staff to solve problems of student culture, to integrate academic and living environments, to create a student civil society, and to build a principle-based community" (as stated in the Academic Vision Plan). Through open lines of communication, a shared vision, and an action plan that seeks to build bridges within our college community, Student Senate will apply our school's Vision and Principles, and our goals is to fully represent students' views and to make Hanover College a better place to learn and live. Student Senate is comprised of students who are committed to serving as student leaders, involved with collaborative top-level decision-making, and seeking positive change for our campus community. HONOR SOCIETIES:

Alpha Lambda Delta

The purpose of this society is to encourage superior academic achievement among students in their first year in institutions of higher

education, to promote intelligent living and a continued high standard of learning and to assist women and men in recognizing and developing meaningful goals for their roles in society. Students must achieve a grade point average of 3.5 or higher the first semester of their freshman year in order to be qualified for membership.

Mortar Board

Mortar Board is a National Senior Honor Society dedicated to scholarship, leadership, and service. Each year, 40 - 50 new members are selected by the vote of outgoing members of the society. Eligible students must be in the top 35% of their junior class, and submit an application during the winter term of junior year. Membership in this honor society implies a high level of member activity toward achieving the organization's stated goals. Other activities include service-oriented projects such as local "clean-ups", book drives for local shelters, and blood drives for campus and community members. Other examples include an annual Custodial Appreciation Week, writing letters to first-year and sophomore Dean's List students, and organization of the Last Lecture Series each term, in which a professor (chosen by current members) is given the opportunity to present a lecture to students and the community as if it were his or her last.

Phi Sigma Iota International Foreign Language Honor Society

Phi Sigma Iota is a national honor society aimed at sharing and enjoying foreign languages. Students are invited to join PSI by our advisor. The Hanover Historical Review - EDITOR

Be an editor for *The Hanover Historical Review*. Among other things, editors are responsible for evaluating student papers, providing comments to authors, annotating documents from Hanover's past, and preparing

manuscripts for publication. In the process of doing these tasks, editors learn a lot about writing, historical argumentation, and publishing.

Kennings Artistic and Literary Magazine

Kennings is an uncensored magazine which prints works by students, faculty, and staff. Our magazine, which is free of charge, is published once a year and is distributed during spring term. During the year the Editorial Board meets every week to read and view all submissions and to vote on what goes into the magazine. All students are welcome and encouraged to submit and join the Editorial Board. *Kennings* accepts written works such as poetry and short prose pieces as well as all forms of art such as photography, painting, sculpture, prints, etc. We also hold three poetry readings throughout the school year which are open to the entire campus.

Revonah

The *Revonah* (Hanover spelled backwards) is the College yearbook. The yearbook staff is the group that edits and publishes the *Revonah* each year. Each staff member volunteers as much time as he or she is willing to commit. There are several jobs associated with the yearbook. The editor-in-chief oversees the publication details. The editor is in charge of scheduling, budget management, bill paying, final editing, final page proofing and other management activities. Section editors are responsible for the content of individual sections of the yearbook. They typically do layout and design of the section of the book for which they are responsible. The photography editor is responsible for taking photographs for the yearbook and for overseeing a staff of photographers. Other staff members may include various photographers, page layout specialists, caption writers and ad sales people. No prior yearbook experience is required but it is helpful. Anyone interested in helping in any way to produce a quality yearbook for Hanover College is encouraged to be a member of the *Revonah* staff.

Triangle

Hanover College's bi-weekly student-run newspaper. The twelve page publication includes campus news, entertainment, features, sports and opinions. The *Triangle* just received new state of the art equipment and software and is doing a complete re-design. Everyone is invited to join in. Gamma Chi groups get together to do fun activities such as sorority house tours and a progressive dinner.

OFF CAMPUS STUDY OPPORTUNITIES:

Australia

Wollongong University is located on Australia's East Coast an hour south of Sydney, on the forested lower slopes of Mount Keira. Both the university and the city of Wollongong are richly multicultural. The university offers a wide variety of educational opportunities, many of which take advantage of Australia's unique geographic location. These include the Aboriginal Studies program, studies in the cultures of Asia and the Pacific Rim, and field experiences in marine biology, geology and other disciplines. Applicants should have a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.0.

Belgium

The Junior Program in European Culture and Society at the Katholieke Universiteit takes Hanover students to the Katholieke Universiteit in Leuven, Belgium. Established in 1425, the university is the country's largest and the oldest Catholic university in the world. KU-Leuven has a reputation for distinctive scholarship with an international flavor. The Junior Program offers courses taught in English in 10 academic areas: Business/Economics, Anthropology, History, Languages, English and Literature, Philosophy, Political Science, Psychology, Religious Studies and Sociology. Applicants to the Junior Program must have completed the second year of study and be in good academic standing with a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or higher.

France

At the *Université des Sciences Humaines de Strasbourg*, in Strasbourg, France, Hanover students have the opportunity to participate in courses offered by the University's Institute of Translators, Interpreters, and International Relations (ITI-RI). Also known as the Marc Bloch University, USHS enrolls 13,000 students and offers courses primarily in the humanities. Hanover students are not limited to the courses offered by the ITI-RI and may take basic-level courses in such areas as literature, linguistics, history, arts, philosophy, theology and sociology. Located in the heart of Europe, Strasbourg is home to many international organizations, including the European Parliament and the European Court of Human Rights, as well as a wealth of historical and cultural attractions that provide endless possibilities for travel and sightseeing. Students must demonstrate strong skills in French, along with approval from Hanover's French faculty, to participate.

Germany

Philipps University is also known as the University of Marburg. It is located in Marburg, an old, small city in central Germany that emanates a medieval charm. The University offers courses that will appeal to a wide variety of Hanover students, but they are taught in German. Applicants for this exchange program must demonstrate proficiency in German to the Hanover German faculty as well as a minimum cumulative grade point average of 3.0.

Intensive Inquiry

The purpose of the Intensive Inquiry (II) program is to bring together talented, intellectually curious students from varied majors with a faculty member of their choosing, and to give them the opportunity to pursue intensive inquiry of their own design in an off-campus environment.

The program you propose should involve the identification of readings or other academic exercises that are designed to engage you and the other participants in two or more days of focused inquiry and discussion.

It is an opportunity for you to work closely with other students and faculty who have an interest in the same things you do. If you plan to do a directed study or independent study next term, you might propose an intensive inquiry as preliminary preparation. If you write a paper on a topic of particular interest, get together with other students for an intensive inquiry on that topic. If you perform a certain laboratory exercise, but want to know what the next step might be, this might be an intensive inquiry. Propose an intensive inquiry about further study of something you were only able to glimpse in a class. The possibilities are endless and Intensive Inquiry is a rare opportunity to build a lasting relationship with fellow students and faculty in an off-campus academic setting.

Internships

Internships are a great way to test out that knowledge you are receiving in your formal education. Spend a semester either in **Philadelphia** or **Washington, D.C.** interning at an organization of your choice through The Philadelphia Center www.philactr.edu, or The Washington Center www.twc.edu. Arrange your own internship experience during a semester or the summer with the help of the Career Center. See Debe Barlow for the inside scoop.

Mexico

The Universidad del Valle de Atemajac is located in Guadalajara, Mexico, a large, and vibrant city 300 miles west of Mexico City. This young, private university has programs in business, communication, computer science, Spanish, psychology and graphic arts. Classes are taught in Spanish and students live either with host families or with exchange students.

Participants must have excellent Spanish language skills, a cumulative grade point average of 3.0 or higher, and approval of Hanover's Spanish faculty.

Spain

Hanoverians can also study at The Universidad de Castilla-La Mancha in Ciudad Real, a small city approximately 150 miles south of Madrid, Spain. This university is part of a multi-campus system established in 1985. Ciudad Real offers a unique environment that will allow Hanover students to experience life in a Spanish community. Students who participate in this exchange program take courses taught in Spanish, and it is particularly appropriate for Spanish language majors. Applicants must display a solid preparation in Spanish (evidenced by grades, an oral test, and recommendations of Hanover's Spanish faculty).

Turkey

Bogaziçi University was founded by Americans as Roberts College in 1863. The campus overlooks the Bosphorus Straits, six miles from the center of Istanbul, Turkey, the city where European and Asian cultures meet and intermingle. This comprehensive university features courses taught in English that cover a wide range of liberal arts, with especially strong programs in economics and the natural sciences. The university attracts a large number of international students, ensuring a rich cultural and intellectual experience. Students must have a minimum cumulative grade point average of 2.5.

RESIDENCE HALL COUNCILS:

Blythe Hall Council

The Blythe Hall Council is comprised of students who are elected or volunteer as representatives for their floor. The Hall Council meets approximately once or twice a month to discuss and plan upcoming programs or activities which the hall would enjoy doing in the future. The Hall Council also discusses any suggestions for items to be purchased that may improve the residence hall community, such as renovations or additional items that need to be purchased for the Hall.

Crowe Hall Council

The purpose of the hall council is to act as a representative assembly for the student body of a particular hall. The Hall Council also coordinates and facilitates various types of social programming for the residence hall. Finally, the hall council also helps to determine what hall improvements are needed and determines how hall funding is to be allocated.

Donner/Ide Hall Council

As a member of the Hall Council, the students have the opportunity to speak for their floor/hall on issues such as Social and Educational Activities, Building Security and Safety, Community Development, Policy Formation and Adaptation, Hall Improvements, and anything they wish to bring before the Council. Also Donner/Ide is responsible with organizing two large social programs... Fright Night and First-Year Formal.

Greenwood Hall Council

The purpose of the GHC is to promote a safe and secure environment that emphasizes individual responsibility, allowing for personal growth of residents. This shall be completed through daily involvement with residents and programming using the Academic Vision Plan and Residence Life CROWE Programming Model. Additionally, the GHC will act as the voice for the Greenwood Suites community.

Katharine Parker Hall Council

Our mission is to help provide a better, safer living environment. Each hall council addresses safety concerns and tries to improve their buildings. All residents are welcome to join!

Theme Housing

The purpose of theme housing is to create a community of students with a common interest or concern, and to allow each community to use its theme to educate, entertain and further unify the larger Hanover College community.

Wiley Hall Council

The Wiley Hall Council is comprised of students who are elected or volunteer as representatives for their floor. OTHER:

Admission Ambassadors

The purpose of the Hanover College Ambassadors is to assist the office of admission in helping prospective students learn more about Hanover College. In addition to assisting with large visit days such as Senior Open House and Junior Preview Day, Ambassadors give campus tours, host overnight guests, call admitted and prospective students, and maintain regular office hours.

Alumni and Parent Relations, Office of

This office fosters positive ongoing relationships between the college and alumni, parents, students and friends through services, education, programming and campus events. Current students and their families participate in Homecoming, Parents' Day, Family Day, Alumni Day, Senior Committee, Junior Committee, Alumni Senior Banquet, and various awards ceremonies. Paid volunteer positions are available.

Child Care Development Centers

The College has two child care centers. One is for infants and toddlers up to the age of three and the other is for preschool and kindergarten aged children. Both Centers are open from 7:30 a.m. to 5:30 p.m. Volunteers are needed at times throughout the day to help at playtime, with art activities, music, outdoor play, and to read stories. Coffee House

The Coffee House located in Donner/Ide welcomes Hanover College students to study and socialize. Various coffee flavors are available.

Computer Workshops

Over three dozen computer workshops are offered regularly by Academic Computing. Most are one hour long. They can help students get skills to do better in classes as well as to get summer jobs. Workshops offered include ten on Excel, six on Word, seven on web page development, four on PowerPoint, and four on database development. All such organizations will be subject to review and approval from our Student Senate, the Student Life Office, the Campus and Community Culture Committee and the President of the College.

Any student wishing to form a new student organization must obtain a Student Organization Registration Packet from the Assistant Director of Student Involvement & Campus Culture. (The office is located in Lynn Hall, room 206). Or you can print the forms from our web site at <http://www.hanover.edu/life/studentactivities/>. After completion of this form, the student must submit to the Assistant Director the following information:

1. Constitution
2. List of Current Members
3. List of Current Officers
4. Student Organization Registration Form, including an advisor's signature.
5. Other information as requested by the Assistant Director (i.e., meeting times).

You may have noticed that some of the organizations are listed as **INACTIVE**. It is very easy to change that status back to ACTIVE, all you need to do is re-register the organization. Here are the steps:

Conditions for Re-Registration:

Registration of your organization on an annual basis grants you the privilege of using Hanover College facilities in compliance with Hanover College policies. It also grants you the ability to apply for Student Activities Budgeting Committee (SABC) funds both in the form of an annual budget and swept funds. Approval of your organization's registration is contingent upon the signing of this form. Your signature indicates compliance with the following conditions:

1. That the authorized agents are empowered to act for the organization in its relations with the College,
2. That these authorized and responsible agents have been elected or appointed in the capacities listed in accordance with the organization's constitution,
3. That the purpose and actions of the organization are consistent with civil law, Hanover College regulations and the Principles of Hanover College,
4. That all students will adhere to the Student Handbook, scheduling guidelines and all other college policies.
